

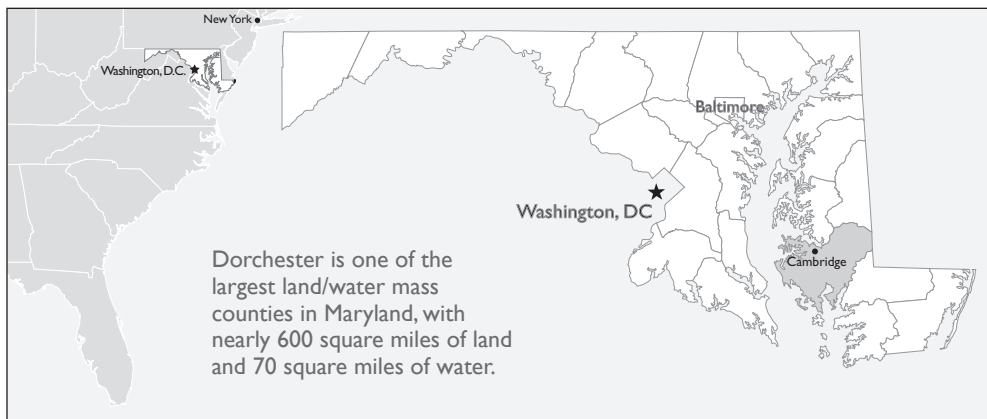
BRIEF ECONOMIC FACTS

DORCHESTER COUNTY, MARYLAND

Dorchester County boasts more than 1,500 miles of beautiful shoreline. It is one of the largest land/water mass counties in Maryland, with nearly 600 square miles of land and 70 square miles of water. Its close proximity to Baltimore and Washington has attracted larger business entities and entrepreneurs due to the county's many business assets, cost advantages and quality of life. Dorchester County is home to 740 businesses which employ approximately 8,890 workers.

The county continues to diversify industry sectors as demonstrated by the development of a 113-acre Business and Technology Park that will serve the county and region. The park is located adjacent to the Cambridge-Dorchester Regional Airport.

The county has two State Enterprise Zones: Hurlock Industrial Park, and the Chesapeake Industrial Park located in the City



of Cambridge (the county seat). Dorchester County is also a federally designated HUB Zone. Manufacturing, services, tourism and agriculture are the primary employment sectors. Key employers include: Amick Farms, Cambridge International, Bloch & Guggenheimer, Foodswing, LWRC International, Egide USA, Hyatt Regency Chesapeake Bay Golf Resort, Interstate Container and John W Tieder.

BUSINESS AND INDUSTRIAL PROPERTY⁶

Dorchester County offers a variety of industrial and office property for businesses. Two industrial parks are located in Cambridge and Hurlock, with easy access to U.S. Routes 50 and 13. Water and sewer service is available to sites in both parks, and the two parks are also located in State Enterprise Zones. The Maryland & Delaware Railroad line serves the Chesapeake Industrial Park in Cambridge.

A new 113-acre **Business and Technology Park** is currently under construction in Cambridge; lots will be available summer 2011.

The new tech park will be served with water, sewer and fiber, and will offer excellent startup, relocation and expansion opportunities to high tech, R&D, and innovative manufacturing operations, as the county continues to diversify its industry mix.

TRANSPORTATION

Highways: U.S. 50

Mass Transit: Delmarva Community Transit (DCT), a fixed route service, is a collaborative effort between several regional transit organizations; special services are available for persons unable to use the regional fixed routes

Rail: Maryland & Delaware Railroad Company with access to Norfolk Southern

Truck: 116 local and long-distance trucking establishments are located on the Upper Eastern Shore

Water: Port of Baltimore, 50' channel, 74 miles northwest of Cambridge; a leading U.S. automobile and break-bulk port; seven public terminals including the state-of-the-art Intermodal Container Transfer Facility

Air: The Cambridge-Dorchester Regional Airport runway is currently 4,476 feet with plans to expand to 5,400 feet; airport is outside of the restricted zones, resulting in shorter waits for landings and take-offs; charter service is offered at Easton Airport, 15 miles north of Cambridge; commuter service is available at Salisbury-Ocean City Wicomico Regional Airport, 35 miles east of Cambridge

RECREATION AND CULTURE

Parks and Recreation: Wildlife refuge areas include Taylor's Island, LeCompte, and Blackwater National Wildlife Refuges; 16 community parks provide recreational opportunities; facilities include Hurlock Athletic Complex, Glasgow Street Athletic Complex/Tennis Courts, and the Dorchester County Pool, largest outdoor public pool on Maryland's Eastern Shore; fishing, boating, sailing, swimming, picnicking, hunting, cycling, canoeing and golfing are recreational pursuits in the county

Attractions: Meredith House; Neild Museum and Brannock Maritime Museum in Cambridge; Historic High Street in Cambridge; Old Trinity Church; Dorchester Heritage Museum and Spocott Windmill; East New Market is an Historic District on the National Register; Vienna, which contains many historic homes, was once a port of entry for the State of Maryland

Events: National Outdoor Show, Flower Show & Fair, Spocott Windmill Day, Antique Aircraft Fly-in, Hoopers Island Fishing Tournament, sailing regattas, classic power boat regattas, Cambridge Summer Send-Off Weekend, Cambridge Power Boat Challenge, Seafood Feast-I-Val, Dorchester Showcase, Grand National Waterfowl Hunt, Bay Country Festival, Secretary Community Day, Choptank River Antiques Show at Sailwinds, Annual Native American Festival and Hurlock Fall Festival
